9 for learner 10 satisfaction

FE Week's 2019 annual league table placed the College as best in Greater Manchester and seventh nationally.

NICDEX rated 172 FE colleges across England in four categories: employer satisfaction, learner satisfaction, 16 to 18 positive progression and adult progression into work.

The criteria is based on performance

measures published by the Department for Education.

Scoring high across all standards, the College achieved 9/10 for learner satisfaction.

This reflects the previous year's position in the top 8% nationally in a FE Choices Survey for student satisfaction.

Biology taster session


Activities for Level 3 BTEC Applied Science and Animal Management students were certainly not for the

His book, Mental Health Wisdom – (Developing Understanding & Empathy) has sold in the UK, Europe and as far as Australia.


Antony faces his own


thrills and spills at the world's premier canine calendar event.



These apprentices account for 3.6% of the workforce, higher than the 2.3% national benchmark for public sector employers.
